COURSE DESCRIPTION

Suicide Awareness and Prevention in Correctional Facilities is a four-hour training designed to increase participants' knowledge, awareness, and confidence in identifying and responding to suicide risk within correctional settings. The course addresses suicide prevalence, potential agency and individual liabilities, common myths and facts about suicide, risk and protective factors, warning signs, and prevention strategies. Participants will develop practical communication and listening skills for responding to individuals who may be experiencing suicidal thoughts and will examine appropriate intervention procedures, screening practices, documentation, and agency-specific protocols for accessing mental health services.

Dr. Amber Landers is a clinical psychologist, educator, and consultant with Embassy Consulting Services who specializes in bringing mental health expertise into non-clinical, high-stakes environments like corrections. She earned her PhD from Purdue University, trained at Harvard Medical School's Cambridge Health Alliance, and teaches as an Assistant Professor at Alliant University's California School of Professional Psychology. Focused on reducing stigma and improving mental health access, she gives correctional staff practical, evidence-based tools for recognizing warning signs, responding to individuals in crisis, and helping prevent suicide in custodial settings.
